Welcome to the autumn term 2024 edition of The Music Partnership's newsletter.

Dear colleagues,

Welcome to our Newsletter! This is the first edition for 2024-25 and also for The Music Partnership (TMP) in this new funding period where we are the Music Hub for the local authority areas of Shropshire, Staffordshire, Stokeon-Trent and Telford & Wrekin.

We are hugely excited to have this new partnership in place, involving our four music services and around forty partner organisations. There are more than 700 settings in this region with well over 200,000 pupils in the school population. TMP partners aim to work together to ensure that all children and young people have the opportunity to learn to sing, to play an instrument and to perform together in music groups, choirs, and ensembles.

We have set out our Programme of Activity for 2024-25 and this can be summarised across three key areas: "Delivery, Support and Performances". Activity by our partner organisations will be based across these areas to respond to the aims and functions set out in the Power of Music to Change Lives, A National Plan for Music Education. You can read more about our partnership activities and keep updated with CPD, events, and opportunities by visiting our website www.themusicpartnership.org.uk

With a region this size, we simply can't meet our ambitious aims without schools. You may remember from previous editions that we have asked schools to help in a number of areas before, particularly with our aims to support musical inclusion and also so we can best target support for school improvement. It is worth repeating some of these points again here:

1. Please help us to improve Musical Inclusion across the region. Visiting teachers often 'don't know what they don't know' so please highlight any children with additional needs to your visiting staff and contact your local music service if you have pupils that could miss out on music provision without bespoke intervention.

- 2. The Music Partnership has a ten-point 'Progression Strategy', designed to help children make musical progress to high levels of attainment. You can help by considering the pathways and options that children have in your school to make music long term. For example, is your whole class programme giving a good start for children but with no option to then take this further? Does your provision relate to transition what has come before or will come after for your pupils? Are all children able to access lessons or just those who can afford to?
- 3. School Music Development Plans. The DfE have asked all schools to have a SMDP in place by September. If you haven't considered this yet then please get in touch, book a Music Audit discussion and look at our SMDP template on the website. A successful SMDP reflects on the success of the current offer in school and then sets out achievable steps to improve provision.
- 4. If you do nothing else, then please look at page eighteen in the new National Plan. It shows a simple diagram that asks schools to consider the health and quality of three parts of music in school: the curriculum, instrumental & vocal work, and musical events and opportunities. This is the best place to start when considering your Music Development Plan and how partners can help support you.

This year we will continue to send a fortnightly email to all schools, which summarises the latest developments in music education and the upcoming opportunities across our region. Please lookout for this email, it will come from your local music service, or you can sign up to receive communications directly, via the website Contact Us - The Music Partnership.

Best wishes from all of us across The Music Partnership for a successful year of music in school. As always, please don't hesitate to get in contact for any advice, guidance or support.



The Music Partnership

The Music Partnership is a group of the region's leading music education providers, committed to working together to ensure all young people have the opportunity to sing, learn an instrument and perform as part of an ensemble or choir.

We receive funding from the Department of Education via Arts Council England to deliver the 'National Plan for Music Education'. We also depend on the continued financial contribution, and investment of time, made by our education partners, including schools, parents, pupils and charitable supporters. We cover the local authority areas of Shropshire, Staffordshire, Stoke-on-Trent and Telford & Wrekin and work with the three music services in these regions alongside around thirty other music partners.

Our Music Services are: Shropshire Music Service, Entrust Music Service Staffordshire, The City Music Service Stoke-on-Trent and Telford & Wrekin Music.

By working collaboratively and pooling our resources we are able to stage large scale events throughout the year giving students the chance to perform with world-class musicians, orchestras, and ensembles. We deliver quality CPD opportunities, conferences and create resources that are available for teachers to enhance the delivery of their work.

Inclusion remains high on the hub's agenda as we start a new academic year with plenty of new directions to explore and challenges to address.

In the last couple of months of the summer term we celebrated and enjoyed performances by our pupils, especially those who face barriers to their learning. Whole primary school classes took part in many WCET (Whole Class Ensemble Tuition) concerts across the hub, in Stoke City Songbirds schools showcased the skills of whole classes of young singers in two concerts, and the In Harmony programme produced two concerts for children from all four of their schools in Telford and Stoke.

I completed an inclusion training course with Music Mark last term. Titled Emerge to Thrive the course was for inclusion leads across the country and comprised twelve hours of online masterclasses and workshops. The learning embraced my inner game: leadership style, behaviours, values, mindset, story, strengths, areas for development, as well as my outer game within our organisations: systems, structure, values, culture, processes, practice, policies, behaviours. I found the course engaging, informative, emotional, challenging and above all else extremely beneficial to my role moving forwards

Training is underway for a cohort of practitioners across Stoke, Staffordshire and Telford who have put themselves forward to complete a Post Graduate Certificate in Sounds of Intent. Sounds of Intent is a model of musical development that sets out how we all engage with music, from children in the early years to older people with dementia, from those with profound learning difficulties who are still learning to process sound, to others who are regarded as advanced musicians in their culture. We look forward to seeing the impact of this up-skilled team, particularly in special schools. Our hub has welcomed our new partner, Shropshire Music Service, and I'm pleased to report that they are now fully involved in our inclusion conversations and activities. As the number of Children In Care accessing funded music tuition across the hub continues to rise, we are planning a series of special musical events for them this term. INSET training at the start of term for practitioners across the hub had a significant amount of inclusion content too as we continue to train our teachers in meeting the needs of all our young learners.

Finally, the ever-expanding AYM programme (which supports talented young people from low-income families to overcome financial and social barriers) is now called Young Sounds UK and Entrust Music Staffordshire's charity FOSYM (which provides financial support to enable children to receive vocal and instrumental lessons and be part of ensembles) has been re-named The Staffordshire Young Musician's Trust. Numbers of young musicians accessing both sources of support continues to increase.

Shropshire Music Service is committed to providing, developing, and supporting high-quality music education throughout the county of Shropshire. We work in partnership with schools, parents, carers, and our community to ensure every child and young person can access and progress in music-making.

We offer a range of services in schools including whole class instrumental tuition, curriculum delivery, individual and small group instrumental tuition, a range of workshops, Live Music Week, discovery demos, and CPD. In 2023-24 we worked in partnership with 98% of schools in Shropshire to help them fulfil the ambitions of their music development plans. Our services in schools are supported by our fully subsidised ensembles, delivered at multiple locations around the county and designed to support learning and progression from beginners to advanced students.

Change Tracks

During May half term, aspiring young recording artists between the ages of 11 and 18 were given the opportunity to produce a professional quality original recording as part of Shropshire Music Service's 'Change Tracks' project; a four day songwriting and production workshop sponsored by Youth Music.

The project began at the SMS Centre in Bayston Hill, where attendees received workshops on songwriting, sampling and lyrics. Within less than two days, the students had formed six bands and had written a complete song ready to be recorded. The bands covered an eclectic range of musical genres, including pop, folk, hard rock, punk and indie. Their songwriting sessions concluded with a masterclass from Brit award winning musician and producer Kris Halpin. As well as giving each individual band invaluable tips to refine their final song, Kris delivered a session on the importance of recording studio etiquette and efficiency.

The final two days of the workshop saw the bands travel to Telford College's industry standard recording studios. Creative intelligence and the ability to work as a team under time constraints were demonstrated by all involved, and the workshop concluded with each band producing a fully mixed and mastered track ready for Spotify or radio!

Feedback from the project has been outstanding with participants commenting that they loved every minute of it. One parent commented, 'massive thanks to everyone for putting on this amazing workshop. It gave useful insights into the recording industry and really fired enthusiasm for an industry so important to the UK.'









Shropshire Sings

June 2024 saw the return of Shropshire Music Service's 'Shropshire Sings'. The long-running bi annual event, consisting of three outdoor concerts at the West Midlands Showground, featured pupils from 44 county schools singing together as one unified choir.

With live musical accompaniment from SMS tutors (Sarah Browne on piano, Karen Kirkland on woodwinds, Andrew Jones on guitar, Simon Tomkins on bass and Jerome Auxant on drums), concertgoers were treated to a diverse set of songs spanning the eras - including classics by Nina Simone, Pharrell Williams, Fleetwood Mac and Queen. A lively musical theatre section provided many memorable moments, most notably an exuberant rendition of Andrew Lloyd Webber's 'Mr Mistoffelees'!

By now something of an institution within the county, 'Shropshire Sings 2024' once again provided testament to the unifying and uplifting power of music, and singing in particular, for children of all ages and backgrounds. Many proud parents could be seen in the audiences, and the British weather triumphantly defied the odds with sunshine over the three days!

Teachers from participating schools shared their thanks for a 'lovely event' with a 'wonderfully varied programme of songs' with a 'brilliant live band'. One remarked: 'it was a great evening's entertainment for family and friends and a memorable experience for the children – one that they will cherish.'





Shropshire Young Musicians Parent Helpers Organisation (SYMPHO)

SYMPHO is a vital part of the success of the Music Service. SYMPHO is a charitable organisation and provides essential fundraising and practical support at public events, including front of house duties, refreshments, and raffles.

Funds raised by Sympho are used to support the work of the Music Service, particularly the hardship fund. In 2023-24, their fundraising work put instruments into the hands of over 500 children, funding 11 Discovery Demos across the county, supported a brand-new ensemble (Riffs) and facilitated a year 7 taster day for over 200 children.




Big Sing and Big Play



MusicShare offer Academic Year 2024-2025





MusicShare is a Singing Schools Programme which is a partnership between Lichfield Cathedral School & Lichfield Cathedral, with significant funding from Arts Council England via The Music Partnership.

Our exciting singing projects for schools are now available and include:

- Four/five one-hour in-school rehearsals leading up to the concert (usually within the same term as the concert) from a MusicShare animateur
- All the songs will be taught in these sessions.
- Provision of all the songs and backing tracks, in a broad range of styles.
- A concert, in Lichfield Cathedral, accompanied by the MusicShare live professional band.

For those schools with a Music Service Level Agreement (SLA) with either Entrust or City Music Service, the in-school sessions are fully funded for 1 project (schools can apply for further projects but they will be charged £500 for each further project). The only cost to schools is to organize their own transport to the final concert, to which parents are invited, free of charge. For those without a Music Service Level agreement with either Entrust or City Music, the charge for each project/concert is £500, payable to MusicShare, plus the cost of organizing their own transport to the final concert. There are limited spaces available for each project/concert so apply soon to reserve your place and to coordinate your rehearsal visits.

The Big Sing

Moreton Hall hosted over 320 local school children from across Shropshire and the Welsh Marches for their Big Sing Event.

The 'Big Sing', which is an annual event, returned even bigger and better than before, and, due to popular demand, this year the event was hosted over two days. The 'Big Sing' initiative, developed by North Shropshire Music hub under the expert guidance and direction of Moreton Hall's Music department, encourages young children to explore the joys of making music and in the case of the 'Big Sing' initiative, generates a love and enjoyment for the art of choral singing. Pupils from thirteen different schools from North Shropshire and Welsh Marches got the chance to experience singing in a large group regardless of the size of their school.

The event was expertly led by one of Britain's most successful and ambitious choral conductors, Aled Phillips, Founder, Conductor and Artististic Director of Johns' Boys, a local Male Voice Chorus who reached the semifinalists in last year's Britain's Got Talent. He was joined by Moreton Hall's own Ellie Diack. Ellie is not only known for her work with Moreton but also through her work with Face2Face Performing Arts Academy which provides pupils between the ages of 9 and 18 expert teaching in dancing, singing and acting. Ellie was also a finalist for Vocal Teacher of the Year in the prestigious national Music and Drama Awards 2024.

Across the day the children were split up into groups learning singing technique and new songs in a fun and engaging way. The day culminated in a performance to their family and friends.

Amy Lott, Director of Music at Moreton Hall, said: "The Big Sing was yet another incredible event. It was so great to see so many children from different schools engaging with both Aled and Ellie. Singing, and music in general, boosts not only our mood, but also our wellbeing. Over the past two days, The Holroyd Community Theatre has been filled with so much joy and enthusiasm, it was wonderful to see and be a part of."

Aled Phillips said: "What an amazing two days! It was a privilege to be a part of such a wonderful project. The children were incredible and the event was impeccably organised and executed by the Moreton's Music department."



Transition event with Royal Birmingham Conservatoire At the end of June, all four In Harmony schools sent their Year 5 and 6 children to Victoria Hall in Stoke for a joint transition project with the Royal Birmingham Conservatoire LEAP Ensemble. The LEAP Ensemble performed some exciting pop repertoire before having an interactive session where all the children played their instruments alongside the ensemble in an exhilarating performance!

Community Performances

Recent community performances include children from St Augustine's Catholic Academy performing twice to the 'Young At Heart' club in Meir; a chamber ensemble of In Harmony children taking part in the Hollinswood and Randlay Parish Council Fun Day event; children from St Maria Goretti Catholic Academy performing at a Feast Day event; and In Harmony musicians aged 8 – 18 performing in their own community concert at Dawley Town Hall in Telford.

Creative Opera Performances

In July, 430 children from Old Park Primary School performed in the culmination of their creative opera project. Over the past few months the children had devised, composed and rehearsed 5 mini-operas, supported by professional opera singers and a composer. With the brief being set as 'a modern-day fairy-tale set in Malinslee' the project saw stories ranging from a sneaky goblin stealing a magical bell, to a chip fairy at the Malinslee Fish Bar! The final performance was held at Telford Minster and saw five orchestras as the accompaniment to the two opera singers.



Youth Leadership

The Telford In Harmony Youth Ensemble (TIHYE) had its first performance entirely led by its members. The repertoire played was selected and chosen by the young people and the final rehearsals and performance were conducted by one of the young musicians from the ensemble.

Upcoming this summer, In Harmony is holding two three-day creative music summer schools, one in Telford and one in Stoke-on-Trent. These will give the young musicians an opportunity to work creatively alongside a professional band to come up with their own musical performances.
