Welcome to the Spring Term 2025 edition of The Music Partnership's newsletter.

Dear Colleagues,

Welcome to our first newsletter of 2025. Thank you all for the hard work and dedication at the end of last term to give so many children the opportunity to perform. Whether this was through events organised in school, by our music hub partners, or by joining our virtual Christmas sing-along, we know that children can't access performances without the support of their schools so for this we are really grateful.

From previous newsletters, you may be aware that our Music Hub covers the region of Shropshire, Staffordshire, Stoke-on-Trent and Telford & Wrekin. This includes over 720 school settings, and we are committed to providing support and guidance to any school or family that needs it.

All Music Hubs have been asked to identify a group of 'lead schools' to provide additional support, capacity and thought leadership for music in the region. We will initially be looking for at least one secondary school and one primary school from each local authority area in the partnership. DfE have provided a set of criteria for leads schools, which will be available from your local music service later this half term along with details of how to register interest.

In September, we set out our Programme of Activity for 2024-25 and this can be summarised across three key areas: "Delivery, Support and Performances". Activity by our partner organisations will be based across these areas to respond to the aims and functions set out in the <u>Power of Music to</u> <u>Change Lives, A National Plan for Music Education.</u> Most schools have some delivery from one of our partner organisations but please get in contact at any time for any help with music in school. You can read more about our partnership activities and keep updated with CPD, events, and opportunities by visiting our website <u>www.themusicpartnership.org.uk</u>. Within this newsletter you will also find a range of information, updates, and activities to engage with but please also get in touch if there is something you need to support your pupils that you feel isn't currently available.

The Music Partnership (TMP) comprises many partner organisations that have a commitment to supporting our programme of activity. For schools and families, the easiest way to access our provision is to contact your local music service who are best placed to support locally. You can also contact TMP directly, through the website - <u>Contact Us - The Music</u> <u>Partnership</u>

This year we will continue to send a fortnightly email to all schools, which summarises the latest developments in music education and the upcoming opportunities across our region. Please lookout for this email, it will come from your local music service, or you can sign up to receive communications directly, via the website.



The Music Partnership

The Music Partnership is a group of the region's leading music education providers, committed to working together to ensure all young people have the opportunity to sing, learn an instrument and perform as part of an ensemble or choir.

We receive funding from the Department of Education via Arts Council England to deliver the 'National Plan for Music Education'. We also depend on the continued financial contribution, and investment of time, made by our education partners, including schools, parents, pupils and charitable supporters. We cover the local authority areas of Shropshire, Staffordshire, Stoke-on-Trent and Telford & Wrekin and work with the three music services in these regions alongside around thirty other music partners.

Our Music Services are: Shropshire Music Service, Entrust Music Service Staffordshire, The City Music Service Stoke-on-Trent and Telford & Wrekin Music.

By working collaboratively and pooling our resources we are able to stage large scale events throughout the year giving students the chance to perform with world-class musicians, orchestras, and ensembles. We deliver quality CPD opportunities, conferences and create resources that are available for teachers to enhance the delivery of their work.

Wow moments with SEND

Through The Music Partnership's Catalyser programme, funded by Youth Music, staff at the City Music Service recently completed a new music project in a SEND setting.

During the project, the team worked with children with severe learning difficulties and various additional needs. There are often many 'wow moments' from this type of music work but some of the highlights have included, children who have limited verbality singing to songs, one child taking interest in a tongue drum and trying it out where participation had previously been limited, 'making potions' on the timpani for Halloween, one child developing musical skills to play loud, quiet, fast and slow; and children who do not usually speak copying key phrases and expressing their choices verbally.

The team commented that: "I do not think either of us will forget the brilliant session we had using spray bottles and ice to create winter, and the two children who gave us all a shower! Staff in school were thrilled with how the children took part, showing skills they had not yet seen."



Trinity Music Awards

Through the same funding programme, the Hub is now able to assess Trinity Music Awards, providing an inclusive option for children where traditional music exams may not be appropriate.

Trinity Music Awards are completed in the children's own setting by recording evidence and submitting to the award centre. There are currently two centres within our hub, in Stoke-on-Trent and Staffordshire, which can be accessed from across the full hub region to process the qualifications.

Singing for Wellbeing

Throughout 2023, Shropshire Music Service ran a series of workshops in primary and secondary schools across the county which focused on singing for lung health and wellbeing. Co-funded by NHS Shropshire, Telford and Wrekin, the workshops focused on basic vocal exercises to help improve symptoms exacerbated by asthma and associated anxiety.

Over 90% of participants experienced improvement in their lung health over the period of ten weeks. The workshops were so well-received that parents and carers wanted to continue with these exercises in the home. Based on this fantastic feedback, our vocal teacher, Beatrice Floyer-Acland spent a day in the studio with our friends at Opus Media Productions to produce a series of videos sharing safe and effective exercises that can be used in any setting.

Connect programme

Young Sounds UK Connect programme is designed to help musical young people from low-income families from the moment the first sparks of potential appear. We support their instrumental learning beyond initial state-funded lessons, so they can keep on playing music well into their teens and beyond.

The key strands for students of the Connect programme consist of:

- Individual weekly instrumental tuition.
- A termly Individual Learning Plan (ILP). The Charanga Online ILP supports young musicians who are learning an instrument by giving them ownership of what they want to achieve musically.
- An annual personal progressions bursary of £50 per student to support their ILP learning goals.
- Termly Student Get Together events. These are collective opportunities for our young people and their families to come together, share new musical experiences, and enables family members to become more involved in their child's musical journey.

- Free ensemble membership. Taking part in programmes and projects run by national music organisations in their area.
- Access to a Young Sounds Alumni Mentor.
- Contributing to Young Sounds events, films and publications.

The key strands for teachers of the Connect programme consist of:

- Termly Teachers' Forums in each area for those music teachers working with Connect programme students. Teachers are paid to attend, and their input plays a vital part in the development of the programme.
- Support young musicians who are learning an instrument by giving them ownership of what they want to achieve musically through termly Individual Learning Plans (ILP's).

These elements, with continuing support from the Local Connectors, aim to deliver high-quality support for participants, developing an excellent musical progression model. The programme targets young people from lower income families who may not be able to continue music tuition without support. For this reason, we set the following eligibility criteria:

- They demonstrate potential on their instrument and a keenness to progress.
- For the 2024/25 academic year we are only able to consider young musicians whose total gross family income is £34,037.12 or less (once £2,335.00 has been deducted for each dependent in the family, including the young person being funded).

In September 2024 Young Sounds UK, launched a new phase of the Connect programme, which supports young people from low-income households to develop their musical talents. The expanded programme will support up to 1,000 young musicians over the next four years across 12 regions.

The development builds on the success of Young Sounds UK's Connect initiative, which has been running for 15 years, and will now broaden its reach. We are delighted that pupils from Stoke-on-Trent will now be benefitting from being part of the programme. Children with identified musical potential will receive support, including free weekly instrumental or singing lessons in small groups and personal bursaries to spend. Those participating in the programme will also be able to attend termly Get Together events, to meet other aspiring musicians, be inspired by professional musicians and develop their skills. So far, in Stoke-on-Trent, we have focussed attention on the notoriously difficult transition from Year 6 to Year 7 and have identified a number of children that shone in their Whole Class Music lessons in Year 6 and have offered them the opportunity to continue with their instrument at Secondary School. Lessons got underway earlier this term and we are delighted with the progress made so far and we are looking forward to creating an exciting programme of events to further inspire pupils.

City Music Service teacher Hal Walker said: "I've been really pleased to teach children that I've taught previously in primary school, that wouldn't have necessarily had the opportunity to carry on with their instrument."



Tis the season for sleigh rides, silent nights and saxophones! What could be more festive than a stage packed with musicians and choirs at Christmas? How about adding some sparkling saxophone from the brilliant Jess Gillam? Young Sounds Connect students travelled to Symphony Hall on 20 December for a festive musical treat. A concert performed by CBSO, CBSO Children's Chorus and special guest Jess Gillam MBE entertained everyone with a feast of festive music, a wonderful way to start the Christmas holiday!

An inspirational concert for our young students to see and hear professional musicians, young voices and a previous student of Young Sounds UK who is now an international musician. As a special treat, our Connect programme students got to meet with Jess after the concert. Young Sounds UK supported Jess from the ages of 13 to 17, helping with the cost of her Saturday studies at the Junior Royal Northern College of Music and enabling her to access a host of musical opportunities, including performing at prestigious venues on the charity's behalf. In 2016, at the age of 17, Jess made history as the first saxophonist to win the Woodwind Final of BBC Young Musician of the Year. In 2017 she made her BBC Proms debut at the Royal Albert Hall, where she performed as a soloist with both the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra and the BBC Concert Orchestra. Since becoming an Alumna of the Awards Programme at age 18, Jess has continued her connection with the charity by becoming a mentor to younger musicians on the Arts Council England-funded peer-mentoring programme, Talent to Talent; now she is the youngest patron.



FOSYM 2023-25 Roundup

Friends of Staffordshire's Young Musicians enables children to experience and participate in the joy of music, and provides inspiration for their futures. From helping an individual child in need of financial aid to learn an instrument, to providing additional income for underfunded music provision in schools, FOSYM provides financial support to enable access to musical learning for children and young people in Staffordshire.

In November and December FOSYM helped support Entrust Music Service with Christmas concerts at Litchfield Cathedral, Tamworth Music Centre, Stafford Music Centre, and Victoria Hall, Hanley. At the Festival of Christmas Music 2024 this December at Victoria Hall in Stoke there were two soloist performances from two of this year's winners of Staffordshire Young Musician Competition - Joel Tennant, who won the Intermediate Singer Competition, and Zongze Li who won the Junior Instrumentalist Competition (both pictured). It was a great opportunity to showcase their talent at the Christmas Festival and they performed brilliantly in front of such a large audience.

Our presence at these events really helps to raise awareness of the work we do and provide fundraising opportunities. We hope that many of the students who benefit from our funding take part in these opportunities to showcase their musical talent. During 2023-24 FOSYM has supported 110 pupils through pupil progress grants (applications through the Music Service) and 9 pupils through financial grants (applications direct from parents where children are taught by non-music service teachers). By the end of 2024-2025 we hope to have increased our support to 200 pupils.

We chatted to the participants of Staffordshire Young Musicians Competition 2024, which was supported by FOSYM, and asked them about the experience and how having support from the charity made them feel:

"I had lots of different instruments when I was younger, ukulele, small drum kit, recorder. I chose the drums because I enjoyed it more than the other instruments. Taking part in Staffordshire Young Musician has helped me build confidence." - Isaac, 13

"I wanted to do music like my mum and dad. I thought playing the trumpet would be fun and it is. Being in the Young Musician competition made me feel very happy." - Oscar, 11

For some twenty years, Gregynog Hall, a treasured historic house in the heart of rural Montgomeryshire, famed as the former home of art collectors and benefactors Gwendoline and Margaret Davies, has hosted the annual Gregynog Competition for Young Musicians.

The competition is now recognised as one of the major competitions of its kind in the UK. And the association with the Davies family has remained strong through the years. The current president is Daniel Davies, whose parents Lord and Lady Davies, were long associated with the competition as well. The competition's Patron, and Chairman of its judging panel, Harpist leuan Jones is well known as a native of mid-Wales, as well as being a Professor of Harp at the Royal College of Music and much in demand as a recitalist both here and abroad. leuan ensures that each year the panel of judges chosen to adjudicate the competition are of the highest calibre, and are also both great performers and teachers in their own right. It is the competition's mission to provide the best musical experience for the young competitors, and for them to get the fairest and positive experience possible from taking part. The competition is run by a hard-working committee of volunteers, drawn from a wide variety of backgrounds, but all passionate about music, music education and providing opportunities for young musicians. Their dedication and drive has seen the competition grow over twenty years into what it is now, but they are always looking for further help and support, whether practically, as a sponsor or by becoming a friend of the competition.

A musical past

Gregynog Hall has a long and illustrious musical past, with an organ chosen for the Music Room by the Welsh composer Sir Walford Davies, and in which room for many years the Annual Gregynog Festival was largely based, formerly under the artistic direction of Anthony Rolfe Johnston. Famous musicians such as the composer Benjamin Britten and tenor Peter Pears, amongst others, have also given recitals in the wonderful surroundings at Gregynog. The artistic history of the hall is immediately apparent to anyone visiting, with still so much tangible evidence of its heyday of printing, pictures and much more besides.

The annual Gregynog Young Musician Competition is open to musicians aged 18 and under, who are selected from an initial listening round to compete in a semi-final competition at Gregynog Hall. From the twenty or so successful semi-finalists, up to five are then chosen as category winners to compete further on the same day in an evening final, after which an overall winner for the day is chosen by the panel of judges.

Past winners

The list of past winners and finalists reads like a Who's Who of present-day stars. Amongst them are the cellist Sheku Kanneh-Mason, who played at Harry and Meghan's wedding, the violinist Charlie Lovell-Jones, who leads the John Wilson's Orchestra which made such an impression at this year's Proms, Oboist Tom Blomfield and French Horn virtuoso Ben Goldscheider.

There are many other former competitors too who have achieved so much after competing at Gregynog, and it is wonderful to follow their successes as their careers develop, and to know the competition has played at least some part in that journey. It is a truly national competition but intensely proud of the Welsh roots from which it has sprung, and it is also supported so well by local businesses and people on whom it really does rely.



2024 competition

2024's competition was held on Saturday 16th November, and welcomed up to 20 talented young musicians from all over the UK and abroad to compete for this year's trophy and £3000.00 first prize. All category winners won £500.00 for coming first in their instrumental class, a level of prize money that is so useful to our young competitors in helping fund their studies and the costs involved.


At a time when there is such a need to support young musicians in their studies, and to encourage young musicians of the future, the Gregynog Young Musician Competition has a vital role to play.
